VILLAGE NEWS

Whitsbury Village Plan (By Steve Husher)

In this issue of the newsletter, we have tried to address some of the feedback and actions from the Village Plan that we published last December. Some of the higher profile village issues were, speeding in the village for which you will see an article on actions your Parish Council is taking to improve matters. Village broadband and digital connectivity was another area of concern in this issue you will find an article on the new Gigabit broadband that will be coming to the village soon. Looking at the feedback we also thought it was worth getting some feedback from the local Police Community Support Officer (PCSO) Steve May. We will address other areas of the village plan in subsequent newsletter issues.

Wessex Internet - Broadband that works - Whitsbury Introduction (By Josh Goodchild)

What does rural living entail? Sleepy villages with quiet lanes, a community centred around a Church, a pub and a shop (if you are lucky enough to have all three). The ability to access beautiful walks from your doorstep. The annual village fete or the weekly event such as a coffee morning in the church or a cricket match hosted at the village field. Quite idyllic really, isn't it? Growing up in the Hampshire countryside I came to appreciate how lucky I was to live in such communities, much like Whitsbury; it is almost like a place that time left alone. There are of course, many advantages to this, such as un-spoilt scenery and an unshakeable community spirit that can only exist in this environment.

However, there are two sides of this coin. Potholes, a distinct lack of buses and finally, the one I am writing to you about, poor rural broadband connectivity. For too long rural communities have been left behind in terms of their broadband. Slow speeds and unreliability; the usual order of the day. A community with poor broadband connectivity suffers on many fronts. It may struggle to keep or attract young families. People, and families require brilliant broadband for tasks such as working from home, homework, gaming, social media etc. Small businesses may feel that the broadband in a community does not suit their needs and therefore, may look to move their premises elsewhere. In addition to this, for those of you who are mad enough to even contemplate leaving Whitsbury; a poor broadband connection can seriously jeopardise your house sale and make it less desirable to potential buyers. Unbelievable in a location such as Whitsbury, but please, ask your estate agent!

For these reasons (and many others) the Government under the guise of Building Digital United Kingdom (BDUK), has been funding the roll out of gigabit capable broadband to rural areas. This is where Wessex Internet intercedes. We work with BDUK and local communities to deliver full fibre connections direct to homes and businesses. This is done via the Project Gigabit New Forest contract, where Wessex Internet is contracted to build a full fibre network to provision the properties in a community. Wessex Internet's community champions (Steve Husher and Geoff Dominey) have said that there is a need for this improved connectivity in the village, and Wessex Internet aided by BDUK will deliver this much needed investment into Whitsbury's telecoms infrastructure. We are currently in the planning stage of the project and our rural planning team have been out and about surveying and finding the best routes to build our network.

I am hosting a community event on **Wednesday** the **11**th **of October** at 6:30pm at Whitsbury Village Hall to explain further about the benefits of full fibre to residents and to answer any questions you may have, and of course there will be drinks and refreshments available. Please keep an eye out for me delivering invites in the village and feel free to stop me for a chat.

Local Police (By PCSO Steve May)

Your local police team is based out of Fordingbridge police office, and is currently made up of two PCs and one PCSO who, cover a wide geographical area made up of three wards, eleven parishes, and the town centre. This includes Fordingbridge, Breamore, Woodgreen, Hale, Damerham, Martin, Rockbourne, Harbridge, Whitsbury, Godshill, Hyde, Ibsley and Ellingham.

Your local point of contact with the police is PCSO 16170 Steve May, who covers all of the above areas. He has been in post for almost eight years and is particularly passionate about rural policing.

As a team, we are responsible for a number of day-to-day things such as carrying out high-visibility patrols, especially in areas where we have had a number of recent reports of crime or anti-social behaviour. We will review

overnight reports and following up with victims where required, obtaining and reviewing crucial evidence such as witness statements, CCTV, or forensic potential. A large part of our role is engaging with the community by hosting 'Beat Surgeries', attending local meetings and events and working with the local schools and groups.

You can pass information and report a crime or anti-social behaviour to the police by phoning 101 or by visiting the Hampshire & Isle of Wight Constabulary website and using the 'report a crime function'. We are, however, often told that there are significant delays in getting through to a call handler on 101 due to the high levels of demand on this service, so we would recommend that you report online if you are able.

Often you may receive an email stating that police will take no further action, however your local police team will always review these reports and will make contact if we feel there may be able to explore investigative opportunities, ask for further information where necessary or to share crime prevention advice. These reports also form an important part of how the team decide where they need to patrol at certain times of the day, where they might need to go to gather further intelligence, and asking for assistance from additional officers and specialist units such as Roads Policing officers, drone operators, and officers with search dogs.

Whitsbury Emergency Helpers (By Chris Cobb-Smith)

A 'Village Emergency Committee' has been established for anyone who may require assistance or have an issue that is not Police or Medical related; this may be practical help or just advice.

Please remember that for emergencies that require immediate Police or Ambulance response still call 999, for less urgent issues it is 101 for the Police and 111 for NHS medical enquiries.

Village Speed Limits (By Geoff Dominey)

For some time Whitsbury Parish Council has been considering measures that may assist in reducing the speed of traffic passing through the village. Options looked at have included flashing speed indicator signs, an increase in the number of static post mounted signs and road markings. Certain of these options were deemed inappropriate for the village due to practicality, cost, management of equipment or appearance. Throughout its considerations the Council has maintained contact with and has liaised with Hampshire County Council.

The Village Plan that was published in December 2022 had specific questions that related to traffic management in the village environment and the replies to the questions have also informed the Councils approach to this issue. Needless to say there was a broad spectrum of suggestions from villagers when asked about how traffic management could be improved but a majority of respondents did feel that speeding was an issue and that there should be some form of traffic calming.

Having taken everything into account the Parish Council has now submitted a plan to Hampshire County Council that should help to achieve the goal of reducing the speed of traffic passing through the village. The plan involves:-

1. Moving the two Whitsbury village signs further out of the village to give an earlier indication you are driving through/approaching a settlement.

2. Placing white line carriageway edging at the two bends in proximity to The Manor and Plain Cottage and, additionally, at the bend south of Lower Farm. The effect of this is to visually narrow the road and may also assist pedestrians.

3. 'SLOW' road markings facing vehicles travelling north (prior to road bends) in the vicinity of New Cottages, The Close and between Mulberry House and Manor House

4. 'SLOW' road marking facing vehicles travelling south in the vicinity of Manor Farm House, just prior to the bend.

5. The addition of a 'pedestrains in the road sign' to be placed on the existing 'accompanied horse' warning sign post by New Cottages and facing traffic travelling north.

We are now awaiting the County Councils response re approval, costings and time scale.

The Parish Council is also maintaining an awareness of what other villages in our area are doing to combat traffic related matters which seems to be a common theme, especially with the number of housing developments taking place locally. At our next Parish Council meeting on 30th October at 7 pm Mr Mike Richards from Sandleheath is giving a presentation of initiatives they are considering, please attend if you are interested.

Do you use What3Words (W3W)? (By Geoff Dominey)

Living in a rural community, street addresses and post codes are not always accurate enough to identify specific locations such as building entrances or describing exactly where help may be needed in an emergency. W3W, if you do not know it, is a system where the world has been divided into 3 metre squares and each square has a unique combination of three words giving an easy way to find and share exact locations.

The system is now used by millions of people around the world. An increasing number of companies also use W₃W (AO.com, Mercedes Benz, Lonely Planet, Ford, Network Rail, DHL and Boohoo) and it is backed by amongst others ITV, Subaru, Channel 4,and Intel. It is also used by Dorset, Hampshire and Wiltshire Police, Dorset and Wiltshire Fire and Rescue and a number of ambulance services.

You can download it at the Appstore or get it on Google Play. It may just be useful!

Green Bags to Green Bins for Green Waste (By Steve Husher)

Just in case you haven't seen any of the notifications from New Forest District Council we will be changing over from the green bag collection to wheely bins from April 2024 onwards. The following is taken direct from the NFDC website.

'We are introducing a new wheeled bin garden waste collection service from April 2024. The bins will have twice the capacity of the current garden waste bags. Collections will continue to be every 2 weeks. Garden waste collections will cost £65 per year, plus a one-off charge of £25 for the supply of the wheeled bin. Sign up in Autumn 2023 and don't pay £25 for the supply of the bin.

If you sign up to the new service in the Autumn this year, we can guarantee you will receive your bin and your service can start on time. We will then deliver the bins between January and March 2024.

Current customers please note: If you pay for this service now, including with a Direct Debit, you won't automatically be transferred to this new garden waste service.'

We understand that you will be able to obtain more than one wheely bin if required.
