A WORD FROM THE RECTOR

Satnavs are useful...but there are apocryphal tales of cars arriving in muddy fields as the Satnav blandly declares 'You have reached your destination'. These stories have some basis in fact; one national Church website placed St George's Church in the middle of a field on the far side of Damerham a mile away from its actual location. Whilst we have route maps and satnavs for road travel, much of life is lived without a clear path, and with the immediate destination obscure. From before our birth a mystery is woven into us. Who shall we be? What joys and sorrows shall we face? What advantages and disadvantages, what circumstances will challenge us? We'll face a plethora of choices, the outcome of which will affect the path we travel individually and together.

Press headlines and the soundbites of politicians and pulpit preachers can make it seem like life's choices are black and white. The truth is that complexity is written into us, our relationships, our society, our world. The story of the Virgin Birth and of a Babe laid in a Manger, of angels and shepherds, the gifts of the Wise Men, and the Flight into Egypt, is often told as a comforting bedtime story. It's anything but. The story of Mary and Joseph is the story of two individuals facing the most difficult circumstances and the most perilous of journeys, with uncertain outcomes for themselves and for a baby still forming in the womb. Their predicament was driven by the will of human powers (Emperor Augustus, King Herod) and by divine intervention (via angels and dreams). Individually and together Mary and Joseph can't avoid the issue. They must choose whether to travel together, or to break apart. Whether to trust and obey or look for a way out. To surrender to fear or take their courage in their hands. To risk staying in the familiar, or step into the unknown.

Their choices are a template for us, to trust that God travels with us, and that - for love of us - God will never step away from our side, wherever our road may lead. Which brings to mind the poem by Minnie Louise Haskins, made famous by King George VI in his 1939 Christmas Address, when all seemed perilous, and hope was a spark in the darkness.

And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year:

"Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown."

And he replied: "Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God.

That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way."

So I went forth, and finding the Hand of God, trod gladly into the night...
